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Summary of Institution Mission and Student Achievement

Our mission is to equip men and women for church-based ministry. We accomplish this through quality graduate-level distance education programs in biblical, theological, and pastoral studies grounded in biblical Christ-centered, historically orthodox faith and worship.

We are affiliated with Grace Communion International, an evangelical denomination with about 30,000 members in 70 nations, but we welcome anyone who wants to learn more about how Incarnational Trinitarian theology affects our lives and ministries. Courses are offered in theology, biblical studies, church history, and in various areas of Christian ministry. Most of our students are enrolled in the category "Master's Level Courses," taking courses according to their own interests. A smaller number choose to work toward one of our online master's degrees: Master of Pastoral Studies, Master of Theological Studies, or Master of Divinity. Any of the degrees can be completed 100 percent online through part-time study.

Aggregated Institutional Data on Student Achievement

All of our students are part-time students. It often takes several years for a student to graduate after matriculating into a degree program. Students can matriculate into a degree program after taking seven courses. In 2018, seven students matriculated. Of those, five graduated and one is still working, for a graduation rate of 71 percent. It should also be noted that not all students want to graduate. Even some who are eligible to matriculate do not have graduation as their goal, and we achieve our mission even if they do not graduate.
