

CM511 Homiletics with In-Person Meeting

Short Syllabus

Instructor: Dan Rogers, PhD

Course description

This course surveys various methods of analyzing the biblical text in order to develop an expository sermon to be given to a congregation. This course also surveys various approaches to the sermon and analyzes which approaches work best in various contexts. This course also involves peer and instructor evaluation of sermons prepared and delivered by the student.

Special note: Students are required to participate in the in-person portion of this course, which will be held on June 26-28 in Charlotte, NC at the home office of GCI. GCS does not cover expenses related to travel, lodging or most meals. (Lunch will be provided on June 27 and June 28 and dinner will be provided on June 26 and 27.) Students need to arrange their own travel, lodging and remaining meal arrangements, and cover those expenses. In addition to the regular tuition, there is also a surcharge of \$165 for this course to cover the extra costs involved in this format of the course. The fee will be nonrefundable unless the class is cancelled by GCS due to lack of enrollment.

Registration will open from April 24 through May 4, and class will begin May 8, which is a week earlier than the classes that are not in-person. All assignments will be due prior to the in-person component. Additional details regarding the due dates will be supplied in the full syllabus.

Requirem ents and assignm ents

- 1. **View:** the 6 video lecture sessions (approximately 50 minutes each) and follow along with the provided PowerPoint.
- 2. **Participate.** Part of the learning in this class occurs through discussion and interaction among the students. This interaction will occur through comments posted on the website discussion forum. This will include commenting on sermons given by other students.
- 3. Read the Kaiser PDF and the textbooks. They total about 1300 pages of required reading. *The more you can read before lectures begin, the further along you will be in this class.*
- 4. Write Papers. This counts for 20% of the final grade. We estimate that you will need about 22 hours to work on these papers.

- a. Book Review: *Toward an Exegetical Theology*, Kaiser. PDF of required chapters will be supplied. (2–6 pages)
- b. Book Review: Biblical Preaching, Robinson. (Minimum 3 pages total)
- c. Book Review: Preaching, Craddock. (2-4 pages)
- d. Book Review: Christ-Centered Preaching, Chapell. (2-4 pages)
- e. Book Review: Passion in the Pulpit, Vines & Dooley. (2-4 pages)
- 5. **Submit:** a 1-page analysis/observations about the techniques/ methodology used in two video presentations (links are provided in the weekly schedule).
- 6. **Preach Three Sermons:** Each student will present three sermons (minimum 20 minutes maximum 40 minutes in length).
